
Henderson Island Restoration Project



In 2011 the RSPB made an attempt to eradicate rats from Henderson Island. The operation failed when it was discovered that a few rats survived and a new attempt is being planned.

To be sure that this is a success a sixmonth research trip is planned for 2015.

The objective is to establish evidence that would provide confidence that a second attempt would be likely to succeed. There is little point in trying again unless we have a high level of confidence of success.

The research will establish: 1) Does the age of bait, measured as number of days of exposure to prevailing weather, influence its palatability to rats? 2) Are there natural foods that are preferred by rats to bait pellets? 3) Radio-tracking of rats to determine if any sex/age classes have small home ranges.
